

Anti-Chinese and Anti-Asian discrimination continue to affect many communities in Canada. Recent

Commissioned by the ACCT Foundation

surveys show over 60% of Chinese and Filipino women, and nearly half of South Asian men, have faced discrimination — especially in workplaces and public spaces. The COVID-19 pandemic intensified these issues, yet public attention has since declined, even though the problem persists. A 2024 Statistics Canada survey reported that 54% of Chinese Canadians experienced discrimination up to a year after the pandemic. To address this, the ACCT Foundation will collaborate with like-minded organizations to advocate for inclusive policies, including anti-racism measures in retail,

employment equity, and community-based support.



This timely initiative underscores the urgent need to recognize Asian Canadians' contributions and address the ongoing realities of anti-Asian racism

and hate. With growing calls for equity and inclusion, the formation of the National Council of Asian Canadians is both salient and necessary. Through education, research, and public awareness, the Council aims to advance a more just society where all Canadians can fully participate. It also plays a key role in celebrating Asian Canadian heritage — especially through Asian Heritage Month and other national initiatives.


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Issues & Outcomes

Saving **Chinatowns**

ACCT Foundation is recognized as one of Canada's key leaders in saving Canada's disappearing Chinatowns. We collaborated with federal departments, Ministers' offices, and local communities to design support options and funding proposals. Our work brought together diverse stakeholders, ensuring Chinese Canadian voices are central in decisions affecting these important cultural sites. The proposal is now under consideration in the federal budgeting process.







Partner Highlight

Established in Montreal in 2011 by a group of Chinese Canadian entrepreneurs and professionals, the **Jiu Ding Foundation** is a registered Canadian charity dedicated to

empowering the next generation of Chinese Canadian leaders. Each year, the Foundation awards \$6,000 scholarships to outstanding university students of Chinese descent in Quebec and Ontario.

"Eating Bitterness: The Canadian Journey from


Exclusion to Inclusion" is a national exhibition that explores the Chinese Canadian experience from the hardships of the Chinese Exclusion Act to powerful stories of resilience and triumph. Through images, videos, and interactive elements, visitors engage with the lasting impact of anti-Chinese legislation and its legacy. Supported by the retired Senator Dr. Vivienne Poy, Government of Canada and the Canadian Race Relations Foundation, the exhibition welcomed over 5,500 attendees, including 2,000 students and 250 participants in cultural dialogues. Its goal is to foster reflection and conversation on Canada's ongoing journey toward inclusion and equity.


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
